To Sir W<sup>m</sup> Denison

Lient Governor of  
Van Diemens Land &c &c.

Having laid before my  
Colleagues in office the plans and details  
so kindly furnished for our consideration,  
in connection with the proposed erection of  
a Temperance Hall and Model Lodging  
House, I beg leave respectfully to communicate  
the result of our deliberations.

I regret having to state that, after viewing  
the subject in all its bearings, we feel compelled  
to arrive at the conclusion, that the expense  
involved in the plan which contemplates the  
combination of both objects under one roof, and  
the limited means at our command, or even  
any prospective resources that could reasonably  
be anticipated, are such as to preclude the hope  
that the undertaking could be satisfactorily  
accomplished.

We are therefore constrained to fall back  
on our original project, of erecting, in the first  
instance, a Temperance Hall, that shall  
include under the same roof, a Coffee House,

Reading

Reading-room and Library, for the use of the working classes; which we should hope to proceed with at once on obtaining a suitable site for the building.

The Model Lodging House would have to be undertaken at some future period, as soon as means could be realized commensurate with the object; in bringing about which the use of the Hall, in our efforts to diffuse information, & interest the public mind in the measure, would be highly auxiliary. We may also reasonably indulge the hope, that coincident with this result, the state of the labour market will be more propitious for carrying out the project economically.

I am therefore instructed earnestly to solicit the <sup>Governor</sup> sanction of the Lieutenant Governor to the appropriation of a suitable piece of ground, say 60 feet by 160 - for the purpose specified, viz.: a Temperance Hall; for which the spot pointed out by the Deputation at the N.E. angle of Murray & Davey Streets (supposing Davey Street to be carried right through) seems very well adapted. And should the wishes of the Deputation, acting on behalf of the Hobart Town Temperance and Total Abstinence Association, which we have the pleasure to

represent, be complied with; we would ask  
the further favour of the Trustees being placed  
in a position to raise money on the property,  
by the Government imposing a sum equivalent  
to the value of the ground, as a lien thereon,  
preventing its alienation until discharged.  
We have little doubt the Society would thus  
be enabled <sup>soon</sup> speedily and effectually to complete  
the undertaking.
